Welcome to the tenth edition of Bears Matter during a very special year that sees us celebrating our 5th Birthday. We have some very exciting updates for you in this connection, but firstly, here's what we have been up to this year so far and what your invaluable support has helped us achieve since the last newsletter.

This time for our mid-year donations, we are making slightly fewer donations but donating larger amounts to four different organisations - two current beneficiaries and two new each receiving £200.



The first organisation to receive £200 is a Winton Bear Foundation favourite and is the Idaho Black Bear Rehabilitation Center. Run by the devoted Sally Maughan she has rescued hundreds of orphaned bear cubs and injured adult bears. She lovingly and painstakingly cares for the bears until they are well enough and big enough to be returned to the wild.

The funds we send Sally will be used to help with the ongoing costs of food, medicine and enrichment for bears in her care.

The second organisation receiving £200 is Forest Animal Rescue, formerly known as Peace River Refuge. Based in Florida, USA they provide lifetime care for non-releasable wild animals. FAR have recently begun rehabilitating black bear cubs and at the beginning of the year received their first little cub Avonaco, shortly followed by Beau. They have incurred substantial costs in building a suitable habitat for the cubs that mimics their natural environment. Our donation will help cover the cost of some of the materials as they ready themselves for more cubs. You can see Avonaco and Beau's release to the

The third organisation receiving £200 is a brand-new beneficiary of the Winton Bear Foundation and is called Free the Bears. Based in Perth, Western Australia Free the Bears is dedicated to protecting, preserving and enriching the lives of bears around the world. They currently work in six countries throughout Asia where bears are illegally captured to be butchered for their body parts, turned into medicine or bear paw soup or incarcerated in bile farms. Free the Bears employ a range of strategies including environmental education, conservation research and strengthened law enforcement to ensure that they achieve their mission to protect, preserve and enrich the lives of bears throughout the world.

We are proud to make them a beneficiary of WBF and look forward to supporting them on an ongoing basis.

The next new beneficiary who will be receiving a donation from us is the Bioresource Research Center (BRC) in Pakistan. BRC is a non-profit, non-political, multidisciplinary organisation based in Islamabad. It works for the conservation of bear species in Pakistan and confiscates bears used in bear baiting. The rescued bears are weak, seriously injured and traumatised so are nursed back to health and cared for at BRC's large sanctuary in Balkasar, north of Islamabad. The centre is involved in monitoring and controlling the menace of bearbaiting in Pakistan and arranges visits to schools and mosques to create awareness against bearbaiting.

We will be making a donation to them of £200 and are currently discussing with them the best way to do this either a cash donation or a donation of materials and supplies so we will keep you updated on this as we hope to continue to support them in the future.

Advancing Bear Care Conference 2015 Sponsorship

You may recall, in 2013, the Winton Foundation for the Welfare of Bears sponsored a delegate's registration fee enabling them to attend the Advancing Bear Care Conference held that year, in the United States. The conference is held every two years and brings together some of the greatest 'bear' minds in the world. This year the conference is being held in Vietnam at the end of October. WBF will again be providing sponsorship but this year we are doing it slightly differently to be most effective. The Bear Care Group who organise the conference want to offer less expensive registration fees for delegates from 3rd world countries, which mean for the same amount of sponsorship from us as made in 2013, more delegates can attend from countries where the bears' needs are greatest. Therefore we are providing sponsorship of \$300 (£200). In addition to this, Else Poulsen, president of the Bear Care Group has set up a new bear rehabilitation site listed under www.bearrehabilitation.org on which WBF is listed as a support organisation.



TOPPING UP 'THE HONEY POT'



Because the Bear Foundation is progressing so well, so quickly, we've decided to have a dedicated fundraising section in the newsletter. This will cover events that have happened, are coming up and ways in which you can help. Funds raised are put into a pot of funds affectionately known as 'The Honey Pot.' These funds are then distributed at regular intervals to projects around the world, working to help bears and protect them from abuse and cruelty.

Five is a very special number this year for WBF as it's our fifth birthday in October 2015 so we've issued a 'Give it Five' challenge to our supporters - and it's looking like being a big hit with people already joining our 'Team High Five'. The challenge was launched during Bears Matter Month but Give it Five continues all the way through our fifth anniversary year so you have months ahead to reach your target.



Join in and you become part of our Team High Five and can take your pick of a whole host of easy ways to help out, depending on how you would like to help us reach that magic number. 

Our remarkable Fostering Compassion project continues to go from strength to strength, gaining great respect and praise from participants and professionals alike.

We are half way through all our activities and workshops for the children this year and they have been a great success.

Through our animal and nature themed events, the children learn to appreciate bears and other animals as sentient beings who can share similar emotions to them. The animals provide a connection that words can't, creating a unique experience for these special children.

By the end of this year, we will have had 110 children through the programme. Considering we started with 13 children 18 months ago, we've come a long way.

We are now having children referred to us from Edinburgh District Council, East Lothian Council, Glasgow Council, Falkirk and Grangemouth Council, Falkirk Women's Aid, Mentor and Children 1st.

We are also delighted to say that after a series of talks to Rotary Clubs in Edinburgh and the Lothians, Tranent Rotary are funding this year's Christmas party for the children and Musselburgh Rotary have made a very generous donation of £200.
