International Animal Rescue

Our last newsletter ended with brief details of the next project we had in our sights. The Foundation pledged its support to International Animal Rescue's wonderful project launched at the end of last year to 'Help a bear see in the New Year'. The project aimed to restore the sight of around 45 of their rescued bears in their sanctuary in India who had gone blind as a result of horrific treatment during their days as dancing bears.

A team of ophthalmic veterinary surgeons flew to India to assess the bears and operate on those who would benefit from treatment. Restoring or partially restoring a bear's sight helps them feel safe and secure again and enables them to mix with their sighted bear buddies. The Foundation contributed £200 to the cost of an autoclave, required to sterilise the equipment.

Bears in Rehab!

The Idaho Black Bear Rehabilitation Centre has been working since 1989 to rescue bear cubs that have been orphaned after their mothers have been shot or killed during the hunting seasons. If left in the wild, these bears would most certainly die.

So they are brought to the sanctuary run by Sally Maughan, who for the next few months of their lives, acts as mother bear. She feeds, tends to and nurtures the bears until they are big enough to be returned to the wild for a second chance at life. The Foundation has donated £100 to their work.

As the Foundation grows and we are building and establishing contacts with various organisations and projects around the world that will become recipients of funds, we'd like to feature one of these projects in each newsletter to help raise more detailed awareness of their work.

The first issue we want to highlight in this new section of the newsletter is the issue of Bear Farming and the work of the Animals Asia Foundation to help bears trapped within this industry and what we are doing to help. We hope you find this new section of the newsletter informative and will learn more about bears and the threats they face.

Bear Farming

The horrendous practice of Bear Farming continues in China, Vietnam and Korea with an estimated 7000-12000 bears confined to coffin size cages where they cannot stand up or turn round and remain in this condition for anything up to 30 years. What the term 'Bear Farming' conjures up in one's mind could never describe in reality the unspeakable cruelty and torture that these bears are subjected to.

The bears have holes punched in their abdomens and into their gall bladder through which bile "free drips" an excruciating process for the bear and one which can cause massive liver tumours and peritonitis. The bile is then used in Traditional Chinese Medicine despite the fact that the active ingredient in bear bile can be manmade.

The Asiatic Black Bear or Moon Bear as it's often called due to the crescent shaped marking on its chest, is the most affected by this cruel practice. This is an intelligent and sensitive bear and thousands of them are enduring a living hell on bear farms. One of the organisations working tirelessly to end this practice is the Animals Asia Foundation.

The Foundation is supporting Animals Asia's superb work to help bring an end to the horrific practice of Bear Farming in China and in particular we are offering assistance with its wonderful 'Bear Enrichment Programme'. Established to enrich the lives of bears rescued from bear farms and to give them as natural and near to normal lives as possible allowing them to exhibit normal behaviour.

The Enrichment program introduces items that provide sensory stimulation, physical enrichment, toys and objects to investigate and keep the bears active and stimulated.

The Foundation has made its first contribution, providing funding for a log wall and a fire hose hammock.

Adopting Bodo

The Foundation has also adopted 'Bodo' and has pledged to continue assisting with his care for the rest of his life. Bodo was rescued by Animals Asia from a Bear Farm in China. On arrival at their sanctuary, he was missing his right forepaw – probably as a result of being snared in the wild.

Bodo is a kind and gentle bear with a beautiful thin v-shaped crescent on his chest. He gets on well with all the other bears and is a great peacemaker. He often breaks up trouble between other bears, either by stepping in or pulling one of the bears away with his good paw! This brave and kind boy has overcome his disability to help the other bears. By adopting Bodo, we help provide him with special treats to keep him happy and occupied – treats like fruit ice blocks, rubber kongs (durable bear toys that he loves to toss in the air), honey, raisins and tofu-filled bamboo shoots (which keep him occupied for hours!).

Animals Asia's Talk on Bear Farming Held in Edinburgh in June 2011

In June 2011, Jill Robinson MBE and CEO of Animals Asia and Dr Heather Beacon gave a talk in Edinburgh. The talk documented their work to rescue bears from the brutal bear farming industry and was heartbreaking as you can imagine. However, the work this organisation is doing to tackle this horrendous trade, is equally inspiring.

We learned about the thousands of bears who are still held captive in farms across Asia in conditions that can only be described as torture chambers for bears, but we also saw wonderful slides of released bears, now living happy and healthy lives in Animals Asia's Chengdu sanctuary.

One picture in the presentation that brought sadness and hope in equal measures was a picture of three deceased bears lined up in a row on the grass in the sunshine. These bears hadn't made it and despite the veterinary teams best efforts, they couldn't save them. However, the warmth and compassion of the Chinese sanctuary staff shone through as they lovingly placed these bears on the grass, so just once they would have grass underfoot and sun on their backs.

However, by far, it was Oliver's story that was the most moving and although the brutality of the bear farming industry has been going on for years, I think this poor bear symbolises it more than anything.

Rescued in April 2010, after 30 years trapped in a cage, suffering the torture of bile extraction and being confined in a painful, heavy metal jacket Oliver, a brown bear and his strength of spirit, is an inspiration to all.

When the Animals Asia team found him, they were faced with a sad, distressed and physically damaged bear. He was unresponsive and in constant pain. He became known, affectionately as their 'Broken Bear'.

After release from his cage, came the journey from the farm back to the sanctuary. During this journey, Oliver's condition deteriorated rapidly due to the bear farm owner having ripped the catheter that had been embedded for years, out of Oliver's abdomen.

Under the most dreadful of conditions, the Animals Asia veterinary team had no option but to perform emergency surgery in the back of the truck where Oliver underwent a four hour life saving operation to remove his damaged gall bladder. Thankfully, there was an immediate improvement in Oliver's condition – perhaps this poor, sorry bear's luck was changing at last.

Oliver's joy at being released from his cage was plain for all to see and he loves his new home at Animals Asia's Chengdu Sanctuary. Considering he spent 30 years – normally the lifespan of these bears in a cage, he is now a curious, inventive and active bear! Despite his stunted legs, he loves playing in the water and with all the sanctuary toys. He is stimulated and happy... and free.

In a League of their Own!

Another new project we have established a relationship with in the last six months is The BEAR League. Based in Lake Tahoe, California, the BEAR League is a volunteer, community based organisation that is committed to keeping bears safe and wild in their natural habitat. Their mission is to educate the public on how to live in harmony with their neighbourhood bears and to enlighten them as to the true gentle nature of the Black Bear

The BEAR League team work tirelessly to teach the public about the Black Bear and dispel any myths. Gentle and docile, with a natural instinct to flee rather than fight, never has a single person been killed by a black bear in California, Nevada or Oregon.

The League work with Law Enforcement, Animal Control and Fish and Game Officers to keep bears out of places they do not belong and educates them as to where they do belong.







Their hotline is staffed 365 days a year 24 hours a day, to help anyone who has a problem with a bear, responding on site or by coaching people over the phone putting people at ease and helping them prevent future problems.

If it wasn't for the BEAR League, many bears would be shot, that don't need to be.

The Bear Foundation has, to date, contributed £200 to their work and will continue to support them in the future.
