
Welcome to the seventh edition of Bears Matter. Another incredibly successful six months under our belt as the Winton Bear Foundation continues to expand and thrive. Here's what your invaluable support has helped us achieve since the last newsletter.

In July 2013 The Winton Foundation for the Welfare of Bears made its first donation to a brand new beneficiary - Forest Animal Rescue, formerly known as Peace River Refuge. Based in Florida, USA they provide lifetime care for nonreleasable wild animals. Our initial donation of £135 (\$200) was used to build a lovely double platform/den combination for the bears, filled with loads of lovely bedding for them.



The funds were also used to run the final stages of plumbing to the bears' pool and electrics with emergency lighting to their habitat. Here's their big male, B-Bear, lounging around on top of his new den while he awaits the completion of his and his pals new 4-acre enclosure.

In July 2013 we bought £60's worth of bricks to support Animals Asia's appeal to secure their sanctuary walls following the horrendous floods in China and the resulting damage to their Chengdu sanctuary. The sanctuary will be strengthened against future flood risks, keeping their bears safe and sound.

The Winton Bear Foundation is working with Sarah M. Bexell, PhD the Director of Conservation Education at the Chengdu Research Base of Giant Panda Breeding. We are delighted to report that we have now funded the cost of 2000 posters giving information on how best people can work to help save this beautiful bear and look after its natural surroundings.

The posters will be distributed to schools in the area and will help educate the next generation on how they can help ensure the survival of the Giant Panda.

Through working with Sarah, we hope to be able to reach around 400 schools and as each school has around 600 or more students that means we can help play a part in educating around a quarter of a million children about the threats facing the Giant Panda. I think you will agree, this is money well spent.

Woodlands Wildlife Refuge was one of our beneficiaries early in 2013 but we now have an extra special reason to support them and she's called Grace....





Grace's Appeal

The Winton Foundation for the Welfare of Bears has pledged to help raise funds for a very special little bear called Grace who is currently a Special Care Permanent Resident at Woodlands Wildlife Refuge in New Jersey, USA. Grace suffers from a condition called Osteodystrophy which means her bones have developed abnormally, resulting in little stumpy legs. Sadly it is also thought that Grace is blind.

As Grace has aged her physical and visual capabilities have begun to decline and she is troubled with osteoarthritis. As she moves into her senior years, we would like to help contribute to the costs of her medication and daily care costs and any enclosure enrichment that would benefit an elderly lady with her special needs, to help keep her as comfortable as possible.

Grace arrived at Woodlands as a 4 pound orphaned black bear cub in 2001. The reasoning for her being abandoned was unknown. This tiny cub did well in care and shortly after her arrival had another cub to grow with. At 11 months it was apparent that Grace was different. There was a marked difference between the progresses of the two bears being raised together. As her cage mate continued to grow, Grace did not. It became obvious that Grace's genetics were not that of a normal bear. Because of her small stature and other anomalies, it was determined that release into the wild would not be in her best interests.



Grace's enclosure offers her opportunities to climb, den and wander. During hot weather she enjoys sinking her whole body into her water tub. She is often seen putting her face in the water and blowing bubbles. When there are other bears in the enclosure near her she often "sits" and watches them. From time to time bluff charges are exchanged as Grace asserts herself as the "matriarch". She is a mild mannered bear that prefers to keep her distance but doesn't mind daily visits from her care givers. She is always eager to get her daily serving of dry dog food and a wide assortment of fruits, vegetables, greens, nuts and special treats. She is known affectionately as Sweet Grace due to her mellow and content manner.

When visiting Grace the ABC delegates helped to expand and enrich her enclosure. After Tracy, Grace's carer told us that Grace loves Christmas trees and behaves like a 2 year old around them, we made a special request that Grace be gifted a Christmas tree from the Winton Bear Foundation.

Wildlife SOS also do wonderful work to educate Kalandar children to ensure when they grow up, they have an education and therefore better prospects for a life that doesn't involve the exploitation of an animal for their livelihood.

In December 2013 we made our second donation of £100 (\$175) to the Northern Lights Wildlife Shelter.

The Northern Lights Wildlife Shelter works to give a second chance to wildlife in need including Black, Grizzly and Kermode bears.

It is the only government permitted organisation allowed to work on grizzly cub rehabilitation. Like IBBR in the US, NLWS works to help young bears in need and care for them until they can be returned to the wild.

We are delighted to be able to support them.

Fostering Compassion



Our unique and ground breaking Fostering Compassion programme continues to receive great acclaim and positive feedback. So much so that we have secured a grant of £12,230 from The Sweetpea Charitable Trust to expand the project to other areas of Scotland in 2014. To secure a grant of this size, in the current economic climate for a project in its infancy speaks volumes about the immense potential of Fostering Compassion. We can't express our gratitude enough to The Sweetpea Charitable Trust for their backing and support. Through Fostering Compassion we hope to help children in Foster and Kinship care find ways to express difficult emotions through learning about and caring for animals. Our first full year of Fostering Compassion saw the children visiting Carmen, Suzy and Peggy the three bears rescued from a life in the circus and now settled and happy in their new home at the Five Sisters Zoo. They then had a wonderful trip to the Links Vets and Canine Rehabilitation Centre in East Lothian where they learned all about caring for companion animals and met two Therapets. The third project was a wonderful Magic of Nature workshop run by Emotional Intelligence Therapist, Fiona Ogg. At the workshop, the children had fun making Dream Catchers, adding their thoughts to the Gratitude Tree and trying their hand at gardening by planting and caring for bulbs. Then they had a little outdoor playtime learning about the benefits of exercise and fresh air.



And to round up the year, the children enjoyed a showing of 'Kung Fu Panda' at their Christmas party.

Fostering Compassion is a fast growing and evolving project which we will report on more next year. However, we would like to share some of the remarkable feedback we have received from carers, children and professionals involved in this years project. I think you will agree the comments are very moving and show how much the children are benefitting from the project. The names have been changed to protect the identity of the children.

"I hung my Dreamcatcher up in my bedroom and my nightmares stopped!" Child in Kinship care

"I want to be an environmentalist!' Announced by one of the little girls after visiting the bears.

"When the children came to me they showed a mixture of fear and disregard towards animals, yesterday they were snuggling up to the Therapets." Foster mum

"They were a great bunch and so funny at times. After exhausting the list of things we shouldn't feed dogs one of the lads suggested a final thing to avoid feeding was 'poison'. Hard to argue with that. And when I asked why we shouldn't let our dogs drink Irn Bru he answered in a weary voice 'because it's full of sugar and gives a caffeine rush – that's why kids love it. Absolutely priceless." Vet at Links Vets

"A lovely thing just happened...the kids were watching Madagascar 3 and they came running to tell me that a racoon was going to rescue a bear from the circus because the bear was sad and being made to ride a bicycle.

They then announced - bears don't like being made to do tricks!" Text received from a Carer

Comment from one family's feedback form...

Q. Were there any memorable comments/feedback the children made or gave to you after each activity?

A. There was nothing after the activities. But Jack had a hamster which sadly died recently. To my amazement he was very very upset. Before taking part in this project I do not think that there would have been the same response. He is very guarded about his feelings but these activities must have had an impact. He has put his 'Santa stop here' sign beside where we have buried his hamster. So 'Hammy knows Santa is coming'.

Because the Bear Foundation is progressing so well, so quickly, we've decided to have a dedicated fundraising section in the newsletter. These funds are then distributed at regular intervals to projects around the world, working to help bears and protect them from abuse and cruelty.

We had a stall there selling lots of merchandise and providing information on the work of the Bear Foundation. Our stall made £255.10 and on top of that the proceeds from the overall event were divided between three organisations – ourselves, the Five Sisters Zoo and Animals Asia so we received an additional £400 bringing our total to £655.10. Thank you to the organisers for all their hard work, to all our helpers and to everyone who attended our stall.



Also in August lovely Veterinary Nurses and Bear Foundation supporters from Links Vets Group, Emily and Alex did the gruelling Tough Mudder event in Scotland. This is an endurance event of military style obstacles covering 10-12 miles. The girls did absolutely brilliantly and thankfully the worst injuries were a cut finger and skinned knees! They raised a wonderful £169.23. Well done ladies!!

In November we held an online raffle to raise funds for Grace's Appeal. We raffled gorgeous Huggie (right) and thanks to your incredible generosity raised £220!




