

THE WORLD'S RAREST BEAR



MongoliAid



You may recall in our Summer 2016 newsletter we told you about a new WBF beneficiary - MongoliAid who work tirelessly to help the Gobi Bear - the world's rarest bear. Well we are delighted to report that we are again supporting MongoliAid with this years food drop. The food drop consists of bags of pelletized biscuits and the formula involves maize and dry tomato husks Each food drop cost \$2425 USD, which includes the hire of two trucks for approx eight days, 1000L of fuel, the hire of helpers, food and a satellite phone hire. The Winton Bear Foundation will be providing funding for one of these eight days a total of US\$320 (£269.21). We will include photos from this years food drop in our next newsletter.

Get Bear Smart

This year we also donated to Get Bear Smart based in Canada. One of their goals is to minimize the number of bears killed as a result of human-caused problems and preventing conflict encouraging police and bear managers to choose non-lethal bear management practices. There are several tools available to help keep curious or hungry bears away from you, your home, business or campsite. Bears are often attracted to urban areas by human food sources and once a bear becomes comfortable accessing these foods, they sometimes follow their nose and enter people's homes in search of more food. This is without a doubt the point at which even the biggest bear lover says NO!

One passive deterrent device is an Electric Unwelcome Mat that can be placed in front of doors and windows to discourage bears. The mats automatically provide negative feedback to bears if they attempt to access the property. They are not harmful to bears or any other animals

One mat costs \$800 so we donated \$400 towards the cost and the mat purchased will be loaned out to residents who have experiences of bears peeping in their windows and doors. The mats are the most effective deterrents on the market. Sylvia Dolson of Get Bear Smart says "We've had so many instances where we could have used one and saved a bear's life."

Our Little Orphanage!

The Winton Bear Foundation's little orphanage is growing rapidly! We have decided to 'adopt' a different species of bear from organisations that are currently beneficiaries. This way, this allows us to support their work and also raise awareness of each species of bear and the threats they face. In our last newsletter we told you of our adoption of Fluffy and Scruffy at Wildwood Trust to join Bodo (Animals Asia) and Max (Liberty Sanctuary) who we have adopted for a number of years now. We are delighted to report that we have now adopted another two bears to add to our little orphanage. We will renew each of our adoptions on an annual basis, helping to raise awareness of the dreadful conditions many bears are rescued from and the organisations trying to help them.

Kudat

Kudat was displayed as a 'Panda' in a mini zoo. He looks curiously at his environment and marvels at all the tall trees. Kudat likes splashing water from the trough but does not enjoy getting too wet.

Malayan sun bears are the smallest bears in the world and are only found in Southeast Asia. These bears continue to be threatened by forest degradation, illegal hunting for bear parts and poaching to obtain young cubs for pet trade.


Kudat is in the care of the Bornean Sun Bear Conservation Centre.



Chitra

The first lady in our orphanage, Chitra was forced into becoming a dancing bear by her Kalandar owners. She had been subjected to years of abuse and injustice. Neglected and made to starve for months at a stretch, she had lost all hope. Unsurprisingly Chitra is wary of humans and prefers the company of her fellow bears. In fact, she plays leader to her girl gang comprising of bears Kasturi, Arushi, Kashi, Avni and Binni. Chitra has a hearty appetite and likes eating watermelons, coconuts and chewing on sugarcane sticks. She absolutely loves dates and ends up stuffing mouthfuls at a time, she even hoards them inside a small mud pit to prevent the other bears from seeking them out!

Chitra is currently in the care of International Animal Rescue and Wildlife SOS at the Bannerghatta Bear Rescue Centre in India.
